The Impact of COVID-19

Long term care (LTC) facilities have been at the center of the fight against COVID-19

Determining factors in nursing facility outbreaks according to <u>independent</u> <u>academic analysis</u>:

- Location of a nursing home
- Asymptomatic spread
- Availability of testing



The Impact of COVID-19

NFs Have Faced Severe PPE Shortages

- Because of asymptomatic spread and the high-touch care that residents need, without enough PPE caregivers cannot prevent the spread of the virus.
- Sourcing PPE from 10-15 suppliers (prepandemic: 1-2 suppliers)
- Documented shortages at times

Testing Is Critical to Protecting Residents

Frequency of staff testing determined by locality prevalence rate (2X/week, weekly, or monthly)



The Impact of COVID-19

COVID-related costs have been staggering

- PPE use and costs have seen dramatic increases
- Personnel costs have increased dramatically through hero pay, overtime, contract staffing, daycare, sick leave, etc.
- Testing costs are significant



LTC Workforce

Recruitment and retention

- Shortage of trained caregivers in critical roles: nurses, CNAs
- ► Labor is the largest component of costs
- Medicaid underfunding makes it difficult to keep up with rising labor costs

Nursing Facilities & Medicaid

More than 6 in 10 Virginians in nursing homes rely on Medicaid

- For years, nursing homes have received Medicaid reimbursements below the total cost of approved care.
- Average reimbursement is \$196 per day for each Medicaid resident
 - This is more than 10% below the national average of \$220 per day.

Virginia's Nursing Facilities

"Typical" NH has ~120 dually-certified beds

- Short-term rehab services (usu. Medicare)
- Long-term services and supports (almost exclusively Medicaid)
- ▶ Before COVID, occupancy averaged 86% (i.e., the average NH was providing care for ~102 patients/residents)
- ▶ 90K patients served annually

Employ nearly 30,000 FTEs

More than half are direct care and therapy providers

Virginia's Nursing Facilities

Residents in our care

- Average age of a long-stay resident = 79.1 years
- Highly dependent for assistance needing help with 8.1 ADLs*
- > 54% of have some form of dementia

*Virginia's metrics for long-term care residents are higher than the national average, meaning their care needs are greater.



Nursing Facilities & Medicaid

Virginia needs long-term solutions to ensure Medicaid nursing care is adequately funded.

- We must implement sustainable policy solutions that protect our vulnerable, high-risk residents in the years to come to ensure they have access to the high-quality care they deserve.
- ➤ Without a solution, nursing homes will struggle to meet the needs of future generations.



Nursing Facility Oversight

Annual survey process monitors quality and enforces regulations

The process: state-assigned and federally-trained surveyors enter facilities unannounced and conduct a rigorous examination of all facets of caregiving

- Resident quality of care and quality of life
- Life Safety Code
- Emergency Preparedness



Nursing Facility Oversight

Survey outcomes: compliance/non-compliance

- Scope and severity of deficiency cited is determined by how many residents affected and the impact of the level of harm created
- Facility prepares a Plan of Correction (POC)
- ► All results and POC are publicly available



Virginia's Assisted Living Facilities

"Typical" ALF serves 50 residents

- Provide an apartment-like setting that allows individuals to age-in-place and receive the assistance they need to maintain maximum independence and personal choice
- Serves residents who do **not** require 24-hour skilled nursing care services

Medicaid does not cover assisted living costs in Virginia

Employ a workforce of nearly 13,000

DSS conducts annual inspections



Virginia's Assisted Living Residents

- Half of are 85+ years old
- ▶ 41% of have Alzheimer's disease or other form of dementia

Activities of Daily Living

>> Typically, residents require assistance with only a few activities of daily living.



















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
